A NEW INTERPRETATION OF THE LAW

(MATT 5:13-16)



Matthew is writing for a community of mainly Jewish Christians:
he therefore presents Jesus and his teachings clearly against the
background of their Jewish tradition.

Our Gospel reading for this Sunday comes from the section known as the Sermon on the Mount. The only mountain in Galilee worthy of the name is Tabor, and that is certainly not the precise geographical location of Jesus' preaching. The mountain which Matthew mentions is symbolic; it is meant to remind us of Mount Sinai, where Moses received the Ten Commandments from the Lord. Jesus has already told his disciples that he has come to fulfil, rather than abolish, the Law of Moses, so he is offering a new interpretation of the Torah and the values which it enshrines.

Today, Jesus focuses on the kind of person a true disciple will be and uses the examples of salt and light, which we find elsewhere in the Gospel tradition. Both have the underlying idea of service to others. Salt is used in cooking or preserving food and disappears in order to fulfil its function. Jesus also describes the disciples as light of the world, which dispels the darkness of people's lives. Hence one kind of service is hidden, unseen: the other is public and direct, at least in its effects. Both are necessary. ■

REFLECT

Jesus' comment about salt becoming
tasteless may strike us as puzzling.

We know that salt does not go
stale. It is something essential to human
health, and in the Roman world it
was also valuable; people were often
paid in salt. However, if salt becomes
contaminated with other substances,
then its power is lessened and even lost,
so it has no use or value any longer.
Perhaps the meaning of this warning
is similar to that of the seed among the
thorns which we find in other places in
the parables of Jesus. We can become
so caught up with our daily cares and
anxieties that our awareness of Jesus
and his place in our lives is diminished.
Or we make compromises with our
Christian values and ideals so that our
moral sense becomes numb and we

find that we do not have the energy
to live out our Gospel ideals in our
everyday situations. But we should not
push the comparison too far: salt may
indeed arrive at a point where all we can
usefully do is to throw it out; whereas
the disciple can always recover her or
his vision and set about living more
faithfully and enthusiastically their
discipleship and commitment to Jesus.

The result of our service of others
should be that they give praise to our
Father in heaven. There should always
be an element of proclaiming our faith
in Jesus, not so much by what we say,
but by the kind of people we are. That is
what Jesus is saying by describing his
disciples as salt of the earth and light of
the world. He is talking about us. ■

SAY

**Preach the Gospel: if
necessary, use words**
(attributed to St Francis of Assisi)

LEARN

The word salary comes from the Latin word
sal, which means salt.

For Matthew, a mountain is a place of
revelation.

Jesus is not so much the bringer of a New
Law as the teacher of a new interpretation of
the Torah: the word *Torah* means Law, but
rather in the sense of teaching, instruction
than legal precepts.

DO

Pour a little salt into your hand. Reflect on
the uses to which you put it. Imagine how
you can have a similar effect on the people
among whom you live and work.
